



Inside the Daf

If someone dies on a יוֹם טוֹב (Festival) we are faced with a problem. On the one hand, it is important to bury the dead immediately. On the other hand, it is forbidden to dig a hole on a Festival.



רָבָא says, on the first day of a two-day Festival, we should ask a non-Jew to bury the dead. Since burial is a matter of human dignity, we are allowed to ask a non-Jew to perform the burial even though we are usually not allowed to ask a non-Jew to do anything on a Festival that a Jew may not do.

On the second day of a two-day Festival, a Jew is allowed to perform the burial. This is because nowadays we keep a second Festival day due to a commandment from the Sages, not because of a commandment from the Torah. Making a proper burial overrides observing the second day of יוֹם טוֹב.

In the time of the Talmudic sage, תְּבְיֵי, there was a nation called the חַבְיִי who force the Jews to work for them. The חַבְּרֵי gave the Jews days off on all the Festivals since they were told Jews may not work on these days. If the חַבְּרֵי would see Jews burying their dead on the second day of מִבְרֵי they would think Jews could perform any type of work on that day. The חַבְּרֵי would then force the Jews to work on the second day of הַבִּינָא . יוֹם טוֹב therefore ordered no bodies to be buried on the second day of a Festival.

Did You Know..

In the times of the Talmud a myrtle twig was placed on the coffin of the dead for his honor.

.The-Chicken-&-the-Egg

We know that an egg laid on יום טוב (Festival) may

not be eaten. What about a chick that hatched from its egg on יוֹם טוֹב?

According to רָב, the chick may not be slaughtered and eaten.
The chick has the same

problem as an egg laid on יוֹם טוֹב: It wasn't "born" when the Festival began. This makes the chick, "נוֹלָד" (born), a category of מַקְצֶה that cannot be handled.

If, however, someone slaughters a hen on יום טוב and finds a complete egg inside, one may eat the egg. In this case the egg hasn't been "born", but is considered part of the body of the slaughtered hen.

Also, a completed egg found inside a slaughtered hen may be eaten with milk, unlike the hen which may not.
