## Inside the Daf

Our מְשְׁנָה teaches that women, non-Jewish slaves and children do not have to sit in a סוּכָּה.

Women are not obligated in the מצוה based on an oral tradition מֹשֵׁה (Moses) received from Hashem on Mount Sinai לְמֹשָׁה ") הַלֶּכָה מַסִינִי"). Non-Jewish slaves have the same rules for מצוה performance as women and therefore do not have to sit in a סוּכַה.

The גְּמֶרֶא explains that a child is not responsible to dwell in a סוּבָּה as long as he still needs his mother.

Once a child no longer "needs" his mother, the rabbis obligate him to sit



inside a סוֹכָּה. The school of רָבָּי יַנָּאי explain that a child does not "need" his mother once he is able to clean himself after going

to the bathroom. רָבִּי מּשְמְעוֹן בֶּן לָקִישׁ says any child who does not keep calling for his mother when he wakes up from his sleep is a child who does not "need" his mother.

the Elder שמאי of the was opinion that even a child who needs his mother is still responsible to sit in a סופה. In fact, when his daughter-in-law gave birth to a boy, שמאי removed the roof over the infant's bed and placed סכך (covering) in its place. This way, his newborn grandson was able to participate in the מצוה of dwelling inside a סוּכַה.

The great sage רַבִּי אֱלִיעֶזֶר was careful to never rule upon a matter of Jewish law if he hadn't first heard the answer from one of his teachers.

But this wasn't because he was lax in his own Torah study.

"In all my life," רָבִּי אֱלִיעֶגֶר "No one has *ever* arrived at the בֵּית הַמִּדְרָשׁ (Torah study hall) earlier than I, and no one has ever left later than me. I have never slept even a wink there and never cracked a single joke or spoke about something not related to Torah study."

רַבִּי אֱלִיעֶזֶר is giving us a lesson about the hard work that is required to becoming a supreme Torah scholar. And even with all that hard work, רַבִּי אֱלִיעֶזֶר would only recite rulings he heard directly from his teachers!
