Now, a non-נְהֵן is not allowed to perform Temple services such as offering sacrifices (see במדבר יח,ז Num. 18,7). And one is not allowed to slaughter an animal on the Sabbath. So would the non-נָהָן be responsible for one sin, or for two?

says, the non פֿהֵן-says, the non פֿהָן would be guilty for both sins but בַּר קַפָּרָא says he is guilty of one sin - the sin of a non- פֿהָן performing Temple services. בַר קַפָּרָא says, since a פֿהָן may slaughter sacrifices in the Temple on the Sabbath, we can't punish a non- פֿהָן for doing the same activity.

יַרְבִּי חִזָּיָא jumped up and swore, "By the Temple service! I heard from רְבִּי יְהוּדָה הַנָּשִׂיא himself (the compiler of the מִשְׁנָה) that he is guilty for both sins!"

This did not sway בָר קַפָּרָא one bit. He, too, jumped up and swore that he heard from רַבִּי יְהוּדָה that he is guilty for only one sin!



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Working Impure

If someone performs two sins at the same time, is he or she responsible for only one, or for both?

We have already seen one example of this (See



"Inside the Daf"). The גְמָרָא gives another example.

A מום who has a מום (blemish) on his body may not perform the Temple service. Also, a אַמָא impure) may not perform the Temple service.

What if מוּם אוּש served in the מוּם served in the Temple while he was טְמָא Is he responsible for two sins, or for one?

Just as in the other case, רְבָּי חֵיָּיא says he is guilty of two sins, and בַר קַפָּרָא says he is guilty of only one. And just like in the other case, בר קַפָּרָא and בַר קַפָּרָא swear that they heard בַר קַפָּרָא הַנְשָׁיא, the compiler of the מִשְׁנָה, rule in favor of their opinion!



Did You Know...

People sentenced to death by the court used to be buried in two different cemeteries. One for people sentenced to death by stoning or burning, and one for those sentenced to die by the sword or by strangulation.
