



Inside the Daf

Do you think it would be difficult to be married to more than one woman? The גְּמֶרָא thinks so. After all, a man has to provide for his wife's needs and the more wives and man has, the more needs he has to provide for! That's why the says that the Jewish court should discourage men from marrying more than one wife (nowadays a man is allowed to have only one wife).

If there are four brothers who all died childless living widows behind, the surviving brother is discouraged by the court from performing יבוֹם (levirate marriage). Since it would be hard for him to provide for so many wives, it is better for him to perform חֲלִיצָּה (shoe removal ceremony) instead.

The אָלֶרְא gives other advice about marriage. For example, if a man is about to perform יבוּם! (levirate marriage) with a woman who is much older than he, the court tells him, "What do you have in common with an old woman? Go after a woman similar to your own age and don't bring arguments into your home!" If a man marries a woman with whom he does not have much in common, this can lead to many arguments.

Did You Know...

Usually the court can appoint a messenger to bring someone to court. For the חֲלִיצָה ceremony, the court must summon the יָבָם themselves!


בּמְזֵרִים - Illegitimate Children

You may have heard the word "מֶמְהַ," before. Sometimes it is used as a vulgar insult, but in the Talmud it is the word for an "illegitimate child."

בְּי עַקִיבָּא says, an illegitimate child is one born from any marriage that is not allowed according to Jewish law. For example, a husband who divorces his wife is not allowed to remarry her afterwards once she has

been married to someone else (see דברים כד, א-ד, Deut. 24, 1-4).

Says, if he does remarry her and if they have a child together, the child is a מַמְגֵר.



A מְמְזֵר is not allowed to marry into the Jewish community. He, or she, may marry only another or a convert.


