ירָבִּי שִׁמְעוֹן בֶּן יוֹחֵי (manna) needed to fall daily. Why couldn't it fall just once a year and supply food to the Israelites for the entire year?

The rabbi answered with a parable:

A king had an only son. Once a year, the king would give his son a sum of money for food for the entire year. Once a year the son would come to his father to receive his money, and would not visit him again until the following year.

The king wanted to see his son more often so he came up with a plan: He would give his son some money for his food every day. This way, the king got to see his son daily instead of once a year.

So too with the בְרָּי שִׁמְעוֹן בֶּן יוֹחֵי, explained רַבִּי שִׁמְעוֹן בָּן יוֹחַי. Hashem gave the Israelites מָן every day. This

way they would direct their hearts daily to Hashem and always remember that it was He who provides their food.

(The אָמָרָא gives another reason why the מָן didn't fall only once a year: that much מָן would be too heavy to carry with them as they travelled through the desert!)

"Why is Mom never here for us when we need her?" Binyomin whined.

"What are you talking about, Binyomin?" Brian asked. "Don't you remember how much Mom has helped us in the past? Driving us wherever we need to go? Getting us anything we need for school at a moment's notice?"

as soon as it's over," said Ilan. "That's why Hashem gave us the אָ every day instead of once a year. That way every day the Jewish people would realize that Hashem was feeding them. If they received the אָ once a year, they would be more likely to forget the goodness Hashem was constantly giving them. "

Wine: The Good and the Bad

The גְמְרָא teaches that there are two words the Torah uses for wine. The most famous one is "יייי" and the lesser known one is "תִּירוֹשׁ"."

The word <u>יי</u> comes from the word "יְלָלָה", or "wailing." This is because drinking too much wine leads to sin, which leads to punishment which leads to wailing.

The word תִירוֹשׁ, or "poor" because becoming addicted to wine can cause someone to lose his job and become poor.

רב כַּהֲנָא " is "רֹאשׁ" is "רֹאשׁ", meaning "head" or "leader." This is because if one drinks wine in a small measure, he can become a "leader" because wine opens the heart to wisdom.
