



# Inside the Daf

Our אַּמֶרָא teaches "whoever is quick to save a life on שַׁבָּת" - even if he has to desecrate the Sabbath – "is praiseworthy." The גמרא gives some examples where one can violate the Sabbath to save a life...without having to ask a Jewish court's permission.



#### If a child fell into the

sea... you can spread a net to catch him (even if you catch a fish at the same time (which is 'trapping' and usually not allowed on שַׁבָּת)



#### If a child fell into a

pit...you can lower the rim around the pit to enter inside (which is 'building' and usually not allowed on שַׁבָּת). In fact, you may even build a step ladder to get in.



#### If a child is locked in a room...you

may break down the door even if you will use the door splinters to build (which is a type of 'building' not allowed on the Sabbath)



### A fire can been extinguished if it is a danger to

life...even if you prepare embers for roasting while you are extinguishing the fire (which is a type of 'kindling' not allowed on שַׁבַּת)



# Did You Know...

The disease of אָפִידְנָא came from eating hot wheat bread or fried fish hash that had been left to sit overnight.

"There goes Motti," said Hudi. "How come he always smells so awful?"

"Watch what you say, Hudi," said Justin. "You're speaking לְשׁוֹן הָרָע, evil speech. In daf yomi today we learn how the bite of a mad dog has no cure. Similarly, someone who constantly speaks לשוֹן הַרָע (evil speech) has no atonement."

"Not only that," added Mattityahu, "but a mad dog's mouth hangs open just like someone who gossips. Its spittle trickles, just like someone who speaks evil leaves disgusting droplets of evil speech wherever he goes. A mad dog's ears hang low, its tail rests between its legs and it walks on the far side of the street so its prey won't be afraid, just like a gossiper will readily bounce on his prey he is talking about."

"Wow," said Hudi, "I never knew how awful לַשׁוֹן הַרָע really is. I should be more careful...after all, I don't want to end up a 'mad doa'!"

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## From Tooth to Stomach

רָבִּי יוֹחָנֶן suffered from a disease called אָפִידְנָא. This disease causes blood to gush out of one's gums. אְפִידְנָא was a serious illness that could be life threatening; the tells us it begins in the mouth but spreads to the inner organs.

Since אָפִידְנָא is such a serious disease, one may violate (the Sabbath) in order to treat the illness.

רֵבִּי יוֹחְנֵן went to a certain non-Jewish noblewoman who was known to have a cure for this disease. On Thursday, she made him a remedy for his illness.

"What should I do if I still need treatment on the Sabbath?" רָבִּי יוֹחַען asked the noblewoman.

"I could give you the recipe for the remedy," said the noblewoman, "but you must swear you will not reveal the remedy to anyone!"

"To the G-d of Israel," said רָבִּי יוֹחָגַן, "I will not reveal this remedy!"

The noblewoman gave the rabbi the remedy for his disease and he immediately told the recipe to his entire class!

What of רַבִּי יוֹחָגָן s promise to not reveal the secret? The גְּמֶרָא explains that רַבִּי יוֹחָגָן had promised not to tell the secret to the G-d of Israel...but to His

people, Israel, he would reveal it.

The בְּכִי יוֹחָנֵן further explains that רָבִּי יוֹחָנֵן told the noblewoman at the beginning that his oath wasn't real and, probably, that he intended to benefit the public with this knowledge.
