If you sin against your fellow man, Hashem will not forgive you until the person you wronged forgives you.

says, even if you irritate someone with words you must ask his forgiveness. In such a case, you should gather his friends around and ask them to seek his forgiveness for

you.

What happens if you try ask ing his forgiveness and he doesn't want to forgive you? רב חִסְדַא says, you must ask him up to three times and each time you must bring three people with you. רַבִּי יוֹסֵי בַּר מֵנִינֵא adds that you shouldn't

ask for forg-

iveness more than three times. We learn this from יוֹסֵף (Joseph) who was asked three times to forgive his brothers for selling him.

What happens if you want to ask someone's forgiveness but he dies? In that case, you take ten men to his graveside to beg for forgiveness.

had רַבִּי יָרְמְיָה wronged רָבָּי and אבא went to ask for forgiveness. While he was waiting, רבי אַבַא's wife accidently poured out water onto his head! When אבא heard רבי about this he forgave רַבִּי יִרְמְיָה

Did You Know...

Someone who causes the community to do good will not be given a chance to sin. Why? Because it wouldn't be fair for him to be in גָּהְינִּם (Gehenna) while his students are in גַן עֶדֶן (Garden of Eden) for doing something good!

-Confession

There is a special obligation to confess your sins on יוֹם כָּפוּר. This is called "יוֹם כָּפוּר prayers of עָמִידָה in all the silent עָמִידָה prayers of יוֹם כָּפוּר. We also recite it when the מַמִּידָה (prayer leader) repeats the עַמִידָה out loud.

Before יום כפור אם פור begins, we eat a hearty meal. חָזַ"ל (the Sages) made a rule to recite a וִידוּי even before we eat this meal. The reason? In case you become drunk during the meal and won't be able to confess properly on יוֹם כְּפוּר itself!

We also say יום כפור after the meal, at night on יום כפור itself.

This is just in case you sinned between the meal and יום כפור!!

The Talmudic sage שְׁמוּאֵל used to stand for וִידּוּי and this is our practice nowadays.





Hillel felt pretty good about himself. He read the Torah reading at the synagogue that morning. Everyone was coming up to him telling him what a good job he did. Compliments galore; his hand was getting tired from shaking people's hands! He was beaming.

"Yes," said Hillel. "And it also says when בְּב זּוּטְרָא was carried on his students' shoulders, he would quote a verse from מִשְׁלֵי (Proverbs) that says, 'For power does not last forever."

"What do we see from all this, Hillel?" asked his father.

"Not to let the honor that people give you go to your head. If the great Sages would make an effort to stay humble, all the more do we have a reason to do so...no matter how many people shake my hand!"
